Background

On January 11, 1868, a dairy distributing milk in Brooklyn, New York delivered the product to customers in glass bottles, marking the first time this had ever been done.

Day 1—Milk Around the World

Materials

- · classroom wall map of the world
- encyclopedias or other illustrated reference materials

Activity

Give students these interesting facts about the history of milk in an oral, large-group lesson. Find each area on the world map. Find pictures of these animals and the countries where they live in reference materials.

- Records from ancient Egypt, Mesopotamia (now Iran), and India show that people raised dairy cattle at least 6,000 years ago.
- Cows provide much of the milk used in the United States.
- Goat milk is popular in countries around the Mediterranean Sea, Norway, Switzerland, Latin America, parts of Asia and Africa, and in the mountain areas of the southwestern U.S.
- Camel milk is used in the deserts of Arabia and Central Asia.
- Llama milk is used in the Andes regions of South America.
- People get milk from reindeer, horses, and yaks in some Arctic regions.
- Sheep provide milk in Spain, Italy, and the Netherlands.
- Water buffalo supply milk in the rain forests of India and the Philippines and in much of Southeast Asia.
