



Collective Nouns

A **collective noun** refers to a group of people, animals, things, or ideas.

- A collective noun takes a singular verb when talking about the group as a whole.
Example: The *team* is ready to warm up.
- A collective noun takes a plural verb when talking about different parts of the group.
Example: Some of the *team* have done jumping jacks while others have done push-ups.
